What is the School Committee?

- The School Committee consists of nine members. There are seven "wards" in Somerville and each elects its own representative. The president of the Somerville City Council and the Mayor of Somerville are also on the School Committee.
- The School Committee approves the budget for the schools, is responsible for district/school policies, maintains contracts with unions, and hires and evaluates the Superintendent.

What is the School Committee considering?

- 1. What should be the relationship between the Somerville Public Schools and the Somerville Police Department?
 - a. How can this relationship be crafted to help make the students and staff feel safer and be safer at school?
 - b. Should this relationship include a School Resource Officer at Somerville High School?

Their decision will take into consideration the opinions and experiences of Somerville Public Schools students and families.

What is a School Resource Officer or SRO?

- According to Somerville Public Schools, the purpose of the School Resource Officer (SRO) Program, is to help provide a safe, secure, violence-free, and nurturing school environment that allows all students to learn and flourish
- To develop positive relationships with students & parents thereby enhancing the relationship of law enforcement with youth and the community
- To provide preventative help and services to at-risk students and families
- To prevent violence and the use and distribution of illegal substances in schools
- In the 2015-2016 school year 43% of public schools and 71% of high schools reported the presence of armed law enforcement officers

What special training does an SRO receive?

- Instruction on common youth behaviors, actions and reactions as well as the impact of trauma, mental illness, behavioral addictions, and developmental disabilities
- Differences in arrest procedures for juveniles and adults
- Strategies for resolving conflict and de-escalation tactics that are specifically effective with youth, instead of making an arrest
- Anti-bias, anti-racism and anti-harassment strategies and how to prevent, identify, respond to, and investigate hate crimes and hate incidents
- Bullying and cyberbullying, and how to identify youth at risk of or who are being commercially sexually exploited
- How to interact effectively with school staff and victim communities and build public confidence with cooperation with law enforcement agencies

The SRO at Somerville High School

- Somerville High School had an SRO for more than 25 years
- There was an SRO at Somerville High School until the start of the pandemic,
 March 2020
- In 2014 the state of Massachusetts required an SRO for each district after the Sandy Hook shooting
- In 2020 Massachusetts Law no longer required schools to have an SRO.
- Spring of 2021 the Somerville School Committee voted to suspend the SRO program pending further conversations with the community
- Currently, SHS does not have an SRO

What are reasons some people do not want an SRO?

- The movement to stop having SROs is part of a larger movement to "Defund the Police", which highlights racial bias and discrimination and the use of excessive force in police forces
- Nationwide, there are examples of SROs using excessive force on students while in the school, and of conflicts that should have been handled by the school becoming criminal investigations exacerbates "School to Prison Pipeline"
- For some community members, their experiences with police officers are negative and having a police officer in school is stressful and upsetting
- Other people or roles can provide some of the same supports/resources as the SRO
- There isn't enough clear, transparent information about the impact of SROs in schools

What are reasons that some people want an SROs protect staff and students from threats - internal and external

- SROs can help schools respond quickly and appropriately in a crisis, particularly if they know the school, staff and students
- SROs develop relationships with students and their families; they can help answer questions and provide resources
- Having regular, positive interactions with a police officer might help students and their families avoid future conflict with the police
- Help educate students and families about their rights and the role of the police
- Help students and families navigate potential conflicts with the police
