I. CALL TO ORDER

Ms. Pitone called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m. with a moment of silence a salute to the flag of the United States of America.

Ms. Pitone asked the Superintendent to call the roll, results of which were as follows: PRESENT - 7 - Curtatone, Futrell, Palmer, Roix, Normand, White, Green and Pitone and ABSENT -1 - O'Sullivan.

Ms. Pitone took a few minutes to mention that this is the first meeting at which there will be opportunity for public comment and read a synopsis of the regulations and procedures.

Ms. Pitone announced that items would be taken out of order from the Superintendent's Report and announced that the first item, one of her favorites, would be the Duhamel Grant Awards and turned things over to Mrs. Skipper.

Duhamel Grants

Chairman Laura Pitone announced that the next item would be taken out of order and announced that we are blessed to have the crew from DEI as our guests this evening. Ms. Normand asked Duhamel President Larry Siraco to step to the podium to talk about the DEI and this year's awards. Mr. Siraco gave a history of the late Mr. Paul Duhamel and the Organization started to honor his memory and carry on his work of dropout prevention and helping the disenfranchised. Somerville High School

Interim Headmaster Sibby LaGambina and Associate Headmaster Leo DeSimone made a presentation on the new Somerville High School that included a very engaging video and informative PowerPoint presentation that have information on the various phases of construction throughout the project. This presentation had animations that more clearly illustrated the changes.

Following the presentation discussion ensued that included the following:

- Members loved the 3-D visualization in the presentation and the video
- The addition of gender neutral toilet rooms throughout the new high school
- The upcoming use of modular classrooms starting in April as the C Wing goes off-line. There will be a covered, secure hallway constructed that will allow students to move from the existing building to the modular.
- Location and capacity of the auditorium and will it be large enough
- The request for the development of a concise timeline of the phases to share with parents, students and community that will let people know what things will be like at the school during the various phases.
- The request to keep communicating with families as much as possible.
- The assistance that the City's beefed-up engineering staff has been able to bring to this and other projects such as the Green Line extension.
- Suffolk Construction is a great general contractor to work with

Powder House Studios Update

Mrs. Skipper was asked to provide an update on the progress on the Powder House Studios Innovation School. Discussion ensued that included the following:

- The hope for an MOA with the STA in the next month or so and then to School Committee for deliberations

B. School Committee email list

Discussion about how to set up a separate email list for School Committee members to post on our website so that constituents can email members directly. Discussion of open meeting law limitations on responses by members, guidelines on referring those reporting issues to the appropriate staff member and the need to review guidelines and establish a policy. C. Resolution regarding Recess

MOTION: Ms. Palmer made a motion, seconded by Mr. Green, to waive the reading of the Resolution and approve.

Members offered input and questions

Mr. Futrell does not want the reading waived and Ms. Normand agreed.

MOTION: Ms. Palmer made a motion, seconded by Mr. Green to amend that motion so that the Resolution is read aloud and approved.

Ms. Palmer read the Resolution, as follows:

Resolution to Support Bill H.235: An Act to Mandate Recess for Elementary School Children.

Whereas: The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) states, "Through play at recess, children

learn valuable communication skills, including negotiation, cooperation, sharing and problem solving as well as coping skills, such as perseverance and self-control;" and

Whereas: A number of national organizations (National Association for the Education of

Young Children, the National Association of Early Childhood Specialists in State Departments of Education, and the National PTA) recommend that schools provide

daily recess for elementary school-aged children; and

Whereas: While recess and physical education are different, and each is recognized to provide

unique benefits; and recess provides unstructured play opportunities that allow children to engage in physical activity and should not replace physical education classes that provide sequential instruction to enhance the development of motor

skills, movement concepts, and physical fitness; and

Whereas: Elementary school children who have more recess time have been found to have

better classroom behavior; and recess is important for children's socialization,

school adjustment, and overall social development;

Whereas: Increased physical activity time during the school does not adversely affect student

achievement; and children who engage in more physical activity have better

physical and mental health; and

Whereas: Children's physical fitness and children's engagement in physical activity are

associated with greater academic achievement and cognitive functioning; and

Whereas: The National PTA and its constituent associations support at least one period of

recess for at least 20 minutes for each elementary student every school day; oppose denial of school recess as a disciplinary measure for academic reasons or inappropriate classroom behavior; recommend that school districts develop and implement policies for school recess that include unstructured outdoor play and unstructured indoor play for inclement weather days, educate students on safe playground rules, ensure the safety of playground equipment and develop an adequate adult to student ratio; and support both adequate recess and physical

education classes; now therefore be it

Resolved: that the School Committee of Somerville Public Schools supports Bill H. 235: An Act

to Mandate Recess for Elementary School Children. Bill H. 235 states the following: "All children in grades kindergarten through five attending public schools shall receive one hundred minutes of supervised, safe, and unstructured free-play recess each week so that there are at least twenty consecutive minutes of free-play recess per day. As used herein, the term "free play" means an unstructured environment, but which is supervised by appropriate school personnel or staff. Regulations promulgated by the department may not exclude recess from structured learning time requirements for elementary school children and may not increase the total number of hours required in the school year to meet the provisions of this

subsection." and therefore be it

Further Resolved: that a copy of this resolution be delivered to the Governor, Attorney General, and

the Somerville state and local legislative delegations and otherwise widely

distributed.

Discussion ensued following the reading. Some members prefer to delay the vote so that they may read the resolution more carefully.

Mrs. O'Sullivan questioned whether recess time counts as part of the 900 hours of instructional time required of elementary aged students.

The resolution will be amended and on the next agenda for acceptance and research will be done to answer Mrs. O'Sullivan's question.

At this point in the meeting, which was at 9:50 p.m., the broadcast of our meeting was abruptly ended due to issues with the recording equipment.
