I. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 with a moment of silence, followed by a salute to the flag of the United States of America. Chair Green asked Superintendent Skipper to call the roll, results of which were as follows: PRESENT –7 – Dr. Phillips, Ms. Krepchin, Mr. Green, Ms. Barish, Ms. Pitone, Ms. Dion and President McLaughlin (7:19) ABSENT – 2 - Dr. Ackman and Mayor Ballantyne

II. REPORT OF STUDENT REPRESENTATIVES

Student Representative Marcia Narh-Botchway was present and reported the following:

- MCAS starts tomorrow for 10th grade students with 2 days of ELA Testing
- Winter Sports have begun

Ms. Krepchin was curious about how students are feeling regarding MCAS, Ms. Narh-Botchway said that for the most part 10th grade students are feeling pretty prepared.

Chair Green asked how the past two weeks have been with the change to masks becoming optional, Ms. Narh-Botchway reported that most students keep them on and take them off during lunch, but keep them on otherwise.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

• February 28, 2022

MOTION: There was a motion by Ms. Barish, second by Ms. Krepchin, to approve the School Committee minutes of February 28, 2022.

The motion was approved unanimously via roll call vote.

IV. PUBLIC COMMENT

Chair Green read the guidelines of public comment and invited those who signed up to comment, to do so in the order called and allocated each person 2 minutes.

Wilbert Pineda – SPS Student (Submitted his comment to be included in these minutes) My name is Wilbert.

I am a member of the first generation of Americans to inherit less opportunity than what came before.

I am a member of the Class of 2024. My classmates and I, and the others a bit older and younger, have borne the brunt of the pandemic. According to the district's Youth Risk survey, 1 in 3 reports severe anxiety and 1 in 8 reports seriously considering suicide. Among my LGBTQIA friends, close to half reported seriously considering suicide. I don't think I need to convince any of you that the pandemic health crisis has created an even larger mental health crisis that some will never fully recover from.

Connected to mental health is hunger. Madam Superintendent. Members of the School Committee, too many Somerville teens are hungry.

I am proud to say that I am working with the Somerville Education Foundation to address these needs. We are working to request City ARPA funds to start a student-led organization to create safe spaces and a range of programs with and for other students. We need your help.

Every day, after school, at 3:55 the principal comes on the loudspeaker to say with more authority than empathy that those of us in the high school library need to leave the building immediately.

Where does he think we are supposed to go?

The school website says that we can rent the library until 10PM for \$50. While it seems a bit strange for us to have to raise funds to enable students to be in the library, we are willing to do it. I have asked and received Ed Foundation support to pay this fee Mon-Thu through the rest of the school year.

I would like to ask that you consider dedicating the \$3,000 permit fees and match with at least that amount from District ARPA funds to provide food for students in the library each afternoon. Thank you

V. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

A. District Report

Superintendent Skipper introduced Dr. Jessica Boston Davis, SPS Director of Equity and Excellence, to share an equity update with School Committee members through a presentation, which may be found here:

• Equity and Excellence Presentation

Dr. Boston Davis shared her presentation and the vision for equity in the Somerville Public Schools; an educational environment where all students are affirmed and can thrive- academically, emotionally and socially. She walked the committee through her slides, which included some of the following:

School Support and Equity Plans

PD's, curriculum support, collaborations with various departments, recruitments & retention of diverse staff and communication with community members.

Collaborations

Teen Empowerment, BAM, The Leadership Academy, Harvard Grad School of Ed. Change the Tune, MA Transgender Political Coalition and AICL.

HGSE Equity Fellows

Two equity fellows – Master students at Harvard Graduate School of Education who will be working on a project regarding reciprocal communication strategy.

- Examples of PD Offerings
- -Anti-Racism: an Indigenous Perspective
- -Schooling for Critical Consciousness PLC
- -Equitable Systematic Training Strategies for Special Educators
 - Student Advisory Council
- Launched but still being developed
- 18 students from Somerville High School and Full Circle
- Hoping to expand to middle grades
 - Curriculum Review
- Revising Social Studies Curriculum in grades k-8 to the new updated DESE Social Studies standards.
 - Equity Specialist
- -One specialist at each school who is also a member of their schools ILT to provide support for school based PD.

Dr. Boston Davis then introduced three of the Equity Specialist at the schools who were also present.

Daphnee Balan from the West Somerville Neighborhood School, Amber Jackson from Somerville High Schools and Kara Dodd from the Winter Hill Community Innovation School. Each Equity Specialist spoke to some of the work they are each doing at the school level.

To end the presentation Dr. Boston Davis announced that looking ahead to the 2022-2023 School Year they are looking to add a full-time Equity Coach position to the district.

Question/ Comments

Ms. Krepchin was excited to hear about the collaboration between the Winter Hill and SHS Students.

Ms. Dion was impressed by the list of offered PD's.

Superintendent Skipper appreciates and is proud of all the work that Dr. Boston Davis is doing, especially because empowering educators lead it. All the work we do as a district needs to be through a lens of equity.

Mr. Buchanan echoed Superintendent Skipper's comment and thanked Dr. Boston Davis for being a great support and thought partner.

Ms. Pitone and Ms. Barish thanked the team for their work and for amplifying student voices and offered support from School Committee for any resources they may need in the future.

Chair Green wondered if the students of the advisory committee could receive a stipend for their work and asked if the Equity Coach position was added to the budget requests for next year.

Superintendent Skipper responded that Dr. Boston Davis is doing a lot of fieldwork and a coach would be helpful in continuing that work. They will formally make the request when that department budget is presented.

Dr. Phillips shared her excitement for the Equity Coach position.

Mr. Green echoed the committee's thanks and appreciation.

VI. NEW BUSINESS (Out of Order)

A. Somerville Public Schools Policy Manual

The Following Policies were presented for a first reading:

Chair Green asked Ms. Barish to introduce this policy as the Chair of Rules.

Ms. Barish spoke to the policy coming to rules and being voted out to regular after several edits. She asked Principal Buchanan to speak to it before reading the policy.

Mr. Buchanan shared that he met with the senior class and asked them what could make this year a memorable one, after how tough the past two years have been. Students spoke to the possibility of an open campus and so Mr. Buchanan told them he would do his best to make this happen.

Ms. Barish then read the policy.

EXTENDED CAMPUS for LUNCH POLICY

Somerville High School (SHS) students in good standing will be granted a privilege to leave school grounds during lunch. The goal of this policy is to support the increasing independence of high school students as they prepare to graduate.

This is an earned privilege which can be revoked at any time if the guidelines and expectations, as determined by the Superintendent or their designee, are not followed. This policy provides the opportunity for upper grade SHS students

to leave campus on foot during their scheduled lunch period. Detailed expectations and eligibility can be found in the student handbook, and parents and/or guardians must give signed permission in advance.

Eligibility

Students must meet all of the following eligibility criteria:

- upper grade member of SHS.
- be in good academic and behavioral standing.
- abide by the student handbook expectations.
- sign the student expectations form.
- have documented parent or guardian permission.

Detailed expectations and procedures will be found in the SHS student handbook, and may be revised as needed by the Superintendent or Principal.

Questions/ Comments

Dr. Phillips thinks this is a great idea but asked some clarifying questions: which are upper grades? What is good standing? Has the reference of the handbook been updated to reflect this?

Mr. Buchanan responded that this year is a pilot for seniors but they are hoping to extend it to juniors next year, the "upper grades" language is to allow flexibility.

Ms. Krepchin asked Attorney Paige Tobin, who was present to speak to the policy and any concerns. Ms. Tobin said she has worked closely with Principal Buchanan and the administration for this policy and it is in a line with other districts that have open campus policies.

Ms. Pitone clarified that it is not an open campus policy but rather an extended campus for lunch policy.

President McLaughlin appreciates that this policy allows flexibility to students and offered his support for this policy.

MOTION: There was a motion by Ms. Dion, seconded by Ms. Pitone, to waived the second reading and proceed to approval.

The motion was approved unanimously via roll call vote.
